STATEWIDE EMPLOYMENT

GOODS PRODUCING INDUSTRIES This is first annual gain since June 2001. Of importance are rapid employment growth in *Natural Resources & Mining* due to higher energy prices and a long

awaited stabilization in Manufacturing.

EMPLOYMENT SERVICES

Up 6.6% in the last 12 months. This subsector of Business & Professional Services often operates as a leading indicator of future employment.

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INFORMATION

This supersector lost a larger percentage of its employment than any other since May 2003. Major contributors to the loss were the *Telecommunications* subsector in Oklahoma City and the *Broadcasting* subsector in Tulsa.

IN A NUTSHELL . . .

"The state's labor market is improving, but at a very slow pace. For the second straight month, employment has shown weak but positive year-over-year growth after a 30-month decline. In addition, seasonally adjusted data shows that statewide employment has improved every month so far this year. For the last half of 2003 and so far this year, we have also seen marked decreases in both the number of unemployed and the unemployment rate along with increases in total employment. These initial reports are encouraging, but it's important to note that the good news here is made up of small gains, and the routine revision process could have more of an effect on the employment picture than it normally would."

All information contained within this document is available free of charge on the OESC website (www.oesc.state.ok.us/lmi/) and through publications developed by the ER&A division. Unless otherwise noted, all statistics are preliminary and have not been adjusted for seasonal factors. All data is collected under strict guidelines provided by the Bureau of Labor Statistics. Although a large amount of data has been presented through the included tables, this is in no way meant to suggest that all data has been included. Due to space restrictions, only relevant industries and subsectors have been included for each geographic area.

MAY 2004 UNEMPLOYMENT HITS LOWEST POINT IN 19 MONTHS

Following on the heels of a 5,000-person decrease in April, Oklahoma's **Non-seasonally Adjusted Unemployment** fell by about 4,000 persons (-4.7 percent) to 74,500 in May. Statewide **Unemployment** has fallen each month of the year, totaling about 19,000 people so far in 2004. The current unemployment level is the lowest it has been since October 2002. For the past 12 months, **Unemployment** decreased by 27,000 (-26.6 percent) from the 101,600 persons reported in May 2003.

The statewide **Unemployment Rate** dropped by two-tenths of a percent over the month to 4.4 percent in May, 1.2 percent less than in January of this year. Since May 2003, the rate dropped by 1.6 percentage points from 6.0 percent.

Oklahoma's **Non-seasonally Adjusted Total Employment** went up by 3,300 people (+0.2 percent) to 1,621,700 in May, its highest level since November 2002. **Total Employment** has increased every month this year. From January to May, more than 38,000 jobs have been added. Over the year, **Total Employment** has increased by nearly 20,000 jobs (+1.2 percent). In May, Oklahoma's **Non-seasonally Adjusted Labor Force**, at 1,696,200 persons, was essentially unchanged from April's revised number. Over the year, the **Labor Force** has lost 7,600 persons (-0.4 percent).

UNEMPLOYMENT RATES FOR ALL MSAS DROP OVER THE MONTH

For the third time in as many months, unemployment rates for all Oklahoma MSAs dropped in May. The **Oklahoma City MSA** unemployment rate was down slightly from 4.0 percent in April to 3.9 percent in May. **Tulsa MSA** dropped from 4.9 percent to 4.7 percent. **Lawton MSA** lost three-tenths of a percent to 3.2 percent, while the **Enid MSA** moved down by two-tenths of a percent to 2.4 percent in May.

At 16.5 percent, **Coal County's** unemployment rate was the state's highest county rate yet again, a position it has held since February 2003. **Okfuskee County** and **Seminole County** switched positions over the month, with **Okfuskeee County** (12.8 percent) in the second position and **Seminole County** (12.3 percent) in third.


CIMARRON COUNTY RECORDS STATE'S LOWEST UNEMPLOYMENT RATE

STATEWIDE EMPLOYMENT PICTURE CONTINUES TO IMPROVE IN MAY

Oklahoma's **TOTAL NONFARM EMPLOYMENT** continued to climb higher in May 2004, adding 12,000 jobs (+0.8 percent) over the month to finish at 1,475,100. May was the fourth month in a row that statewide employment has improved. Since May 2003, the state has gained 7,700 jobs (+0.5 percent). Under the **Goods Producing Industries**, **Construction** (+1,400 jobs) and **Manufacturing** (+1,500 jobs) provided most of the over-the-month growth. Growth was more widespread in the **Service Providing Industries**, as **Leisure and Hospitality Services** led all contributors with a 2,500-job gain in May. The gains recorded in both **Construction** and **Leisure and Hospitality Services** were seasonal in nature.

SUPPORT ACTIVITIES DRIVE CONTINUED ANNUAL GROWTH

For the third month in a row, **Natural Resources and Mining** gained jobs, adding 100 jobs (+0.3 percent) over the month and growing by 1,900 jobs (+6.7 percent) since May 2003. **Support Activities for Mining** provided 1,500 jobs to this annual growth, a gain of 11.3 percent over the subsector's May 2003 employment level.

SEASONAL GAINS KEEP CONSTRUCTION ON THE MEND

With the onset of warm weather, **Construction** was booming in May and posted employment gains for the fourth consecutive month. The supersector's 1,400-job addition (+2.2 percent) over the month puts **Construction** 200 jobs higher than its May 2003 employment level. The monthly gains were spread over the **Construction** subsectors, with **Specialty Trade Contractors** providing 800 of the jobs gained in May.

STATEWIDE MANUFACTURING CONTINUES ITS RECOVERY IN MAY

Manufacturing gained 1,500 jobs (+1.1 percent) in May 2004, bringing its over-the-year loss to 100 jobs (-0.1 percent). This gain is good news for the supersector, which is still recovering after losing a large number of jobs to business relocation or shutdown over the past 18 months. Durable Goods accounted for two-thirds of the gain in Manufacturing due mostly to strong performances by Fabricated Metal Product Manufacturing and Transportation Equipment Manufacturing. Food Manufacturing was the big over-the-month contributor to Nondurable Goods Manufacturing with a 400-job gain (+2.1 percent).

TRADE, TRANSPORTATION AND UTILITIES ADDS JOBS OVER THE MONTH

Trade, Transportation and Utilities experienced minor growth over the month with a gain of 1,300 jobs (+0.5 percent). This gain moved the supersector to the same employment level it held in May 2003. Over the past year, **General Merchandise Stores** have been gaining ground, driving **Retail Trade** to a small annual addition.

FINANCIAL ACTIVITIES CONTINUES TO IMPROVE IN MAY 2004

Financial Activities once again added jobs over the month, gaining 700 (+0.8 percent) in May and 2,200 (+2.7 percent) over the year. This supersector has grown in nine of the past ten months. Over the past year, the **Finance and Insurance** subsector has accounted for over 70 percent of the job production for **Financial Activities** by gaining 1,600 jobs (+2.7 percent).

ADMINISTRATIVE AND SUPPORT SERVICES CONTINUE TO DRIVE GROWTH

Professional and Business Services added 1,400 jobs (+0.9 percent) over the month and 3,000 jobs (+1.9 percent) over the year due mostly to large gains in the **Administrative and Support Services** subsector. **Employment Services** accounted for most of the over-the-year gain, a sign that the state employment situation is improving.

EDUCATIONAL AND HEALTH SERVICES CONTINUES TO GROW STRONGER

Educational and Health Services posted small gains in May, adding 800 jobs (+0.5 percent) over the month and 1,900 jobs (+1.1 percent) over the year. **Health Care and Social Assistance** provided all of the over-the-month growth as seasonal factors affected **Educational Services**. Over the past year, **Educational Services** has grown by 7.9 percent (+1,300 jobs). Under **Health Care and Social Assistance**, **Ambulatory Health Care** added 2,100 jobs (+3.9 percent) since May 2003, while **Nursing and Residential Care** dropped 1,600 jobs (-4.4 percent).

ACCOMMODATION AND FOOD SERVICES DRIVES GROWTH IN MAY

Leisure and Hospitality Services continued its recovery in May by gaining 2,500 jobs (+2.0 percent). A majority of the over-the-month gain came from **Accommodation and Food Services**, which received a seasonal bump thanks to the warmer weather and onset of the summer vacation season. Despite this strong monthly performance, **Leisure and Hospitality Services** is still 1,300 jobs (-1.0 percent) off its May 2003 employment level.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT PUSHES SUPERSECTOR TO MONTHLY GAINS

May proved to be a month of gains for **Government** as **Local Government** led the charge. Three quarters of the monthly gain was contributed by **Local Government**, which added 1,200 jobs (+0.7 percent) in May. Over the past year, gains recorded by **State Government** have been overshadowed by **Federal Government** losses. **Government** now stands 200 jobs shy of the supersector's May 2003 employment level.

OKC ADDS JOBS IN MAY, RECORDS STRONG GAIN OVER PAST YEAR

TOTAL NONFARM EMPLOYMENT in the Oklahoma City MSA continued its improvement in May, gaining 3,000 jobs (+0.6 percent) over the month to reach 543,700 jobs. This leaves Oklahoma City 6,100 jobs higher (+1.1 percent) than its May 2003 employment level. The **Goods Producing Industries** supplied 1,200 jobs to the monthly growth due to seasonal gains in **Construction** and additions in **Manufacturing**. The **Service Providing Industries** recorded an 1,800-job addition in May and supplied 5,400 jobs since this time last year. Most of this over-the-year growth came from **Professional and Business Services** and **Educational and Health Services**.

WARMER WEATHER BRINGS ON HIRING IN OKC CONSTRUCTION

Construction enjoyed a productive month as seasonal factors such as warm weather caused the supersector to grow. **Construction** added 700 jobs (+3.1 percent) in May and 600 jobs (+2.7 percent) since this time last year. The **Specialty Trade Contractors** subsector was one of the driving forces behind this growth.

MANUFACTURING ADDS JOBS IN MAY, LOOKS TO BEGIN RECOVERY

Manufacturing rebounded in May 2004 and added 500 jobs (+1.3 percent) over the month, bringing its overthe-year shift to a loss of 300 jobs (-0.8 percent). Both **Durable Goods** and **Non-durable Goods** contributed to the monthly gain. **Computers and Electronics**, which dropped over 20 percent of its workforce in May, provided most of the annual loss recorded by **Durable Goods**.

RETAIL TRADE SUPPLIES MOST OF OVER-THE-YEAR FOR TTU

While managing to post a monthly gain of 300 jobs (+0.3 percent), **Trade, Transportation and Utilities (TTU)** only added about half the number of jobs that it did the previous month. The monthly gain was shared evenly between **Wholesale Trade**, **Retail Trade**, and **Transportation**, **Warehouse and Utilities**. A majority of the overthe-year gain came from **Retail Trade**, which has added 800 jobs (+1.3 percent) since May 2003.

Although **Information** managed a marginal monthly gain in May, the supersector is still down 1,200 jobs (-8.8 percent) compared to one year ago. The **Telecommunications** subsector has contributed 500 jobs (-8.5 percent) to the annual loss.

PROFESSIONAL AND BUSINESS SERVICES OUTPERFORMS MAY 2003

Professional and Business Services reversed its monthly growth trend with a loss of 200 jobs (-0.3 percent) in May. Since May 2003, the supersector has gained 2,500 jobs (+3.7 percent) due to large gains in the **Administrative and Support Services** subsector. **Employment Services**, a good indicator of job market growth, again added jobs, gaining 400 (+2.2 percent) over the month and 1,500 (+8.9 percent) over the past year.
