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OKLAHOMA STATE UNEMPLOYMENT RATE DROPS TO 4.1 PERCENT IN FEBRUARY

- February's **statewide non-seasonally adjusted unemployment rate** dropped to 4.1 percent after reaching 4.4 percent in January. The December-to-January unemployment rate spike and the subsequent January-to-February drop follow a pattern seen each year.
- February 2006 was the fifth consecutive month that Oklahoma's seasonally adjusted unemployment fell
 while seasonally adjusted employment grew. Since August 2005, unemployment has fallen by more than
 14,000 people, while employment added just over 18,000 persons.
- Compared to February 2005, both non-seasonally adjusted and seasonally adjusted unemployment have been reduced significantly. Non-seasonally adjusted unemployment dropped more than 16,000 persons (-18.5 percent) over the year. Seasonally adjusted unemployment also shrank, shedding over 11,000 persons (-15.2 percent) during the February-to-February period.

Non-benchmarked monthly data for the past year has been omitted to avoid confusion with the upcoming revised data. The benchmarked data is tentatively scheduled for release on April 21, 2006.
